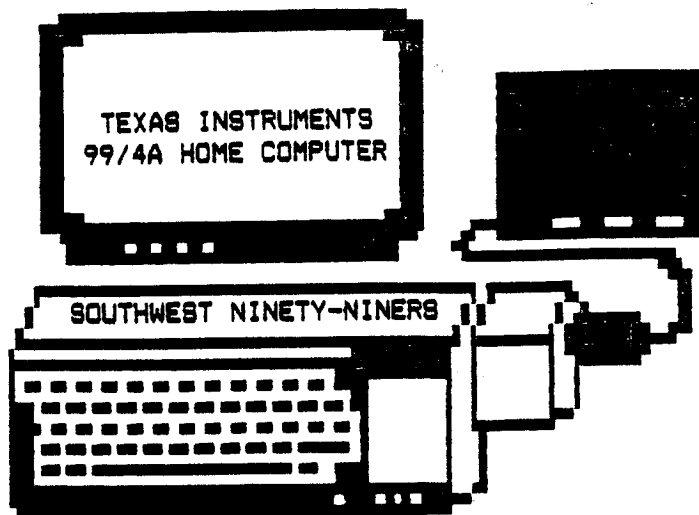

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'99 FEST WEST '86
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When Jack and I decided to go to the '99 FEST-WEST '86, we were apprehensive that we would find out that we knew so little about our computer that we would be put to shame. However our enthusiasm about our computer and our Users' Group made us decide to go anyway.

The week before we left Wesley brought over BA-Writer FREEWARE that he had gotten from Italy. It had been given high marks in a review in the March MICROpendium. We soon found it was an improvement over TI-Writer. Little did we know that it would be so important on our trip to LA.

We arrived on Friday evening checked into our hotel and went to dinner. We knew there was supposed to be a hospitality room somewhere but didn't know where. As we finished our meal a large group of people came in and took over the back room. We guessed they were "the computer people". We were right and found we were soon talking to people from all over the U.S. about the TI, each others systems, and Users' Groups. The first night we met many of the names we've all come to recognize in the TI community: Terrie Masters, the President of the LA Users' Group; Les Merryman, the MYARC distributor for the west coast; William Warren, the author of PRBASE; and the presidents of Cin-Day Users Group and of Northern Nevada Users Group. We saw Craig Miller from a distance! Craig is probably the STAR of the TI community and even seeing him from a distance reminded me of groupies in the music business. After dinner we went with William Warren for a demonstration of his latest, and as yet incomplete, version of PRBASE. Every disadvantage listed in this newsletter last month was eliminated. We paid him on the spot for our copy and for the our User Group's copy. Bill is completely unpretentious and any user of the TI could easily talk with him for hours. The subject of BA-writer came up and we were soon explaining all it's features. Sadly we admitted that we hadn't brought it with us, as we figured if our Group had it we were probably one of the last to get it. We promised to send it to him and several others there as soon as we got home.

After a good night's sleep and breakfast with members of our group and Al Armstrong's brother, we walked about 3/4 of a block to the Shrine Exhibition Hall. The main floor was filled with all the other computers and their peripherals, but the mezanine was all TI. There were around twenty booths and many items available for the TI that Jack and I had never seen before. Many of these companies are very young and have very young owners. We were delighted with the show of items available.

We talked to Craig Miller. He is bright, innovative and seems inherrently honest. Craig seems to sense the technical knowledge of those he is talking with and adjusts to their level. When we asked him what his new product for the TI was his eyes began to twinkle, he looked like he could hardly stand to keep it a secret, but he said we would have to wait for his presentation later in the morning.

Jack and I moved on to the Super 99 Monthly booth. As we were standing there Jack poked at me. "Isn't that him?", he said as he nodded toward a man signing his name to an application. Sure enough I saw the name of Paolo Bagnaresi, the author of BA-Writer being written. We quickly introduced ourselves and found that he was indeed THE Paolo Bagnaresi. The next booth was the FREEWARE booth. We told William Warren and several others that Paolo was there and pointed him out. Paolo soon became known on sight and Jack and I became known as the ones who "know all about BA-Writer". We demonstrated it at many of the booths and made arrangements for many to get their copy. Paolo was soon flooded with people asking for his FREEWARE and paying him for it. Luckily he had many copies of it with him. Thanks to our secretary, Wesley, Jack and I had firsthand knowledge of something that opened a lot

of doors for us and hopefully opened a lot of doors to Paolo because we recognized him.

As promised Craig Miller announced his new idea in hardware for the TI-99/4A later that morning. He has designed a board to go into the Peripheral Expansion Box that allows you to hook up any IBM keyboard. There will be two phases to the introduction of this innovative idea. The first will allow you to hook up and use the IBM keyboard, the computer will not be aware that you are not using the TI board. In the second phase chips will be added that will allow you to have programmable keys with a buffer and a battery back-up. The battery back-up will allow your programmable keyboard to keep its programs even when the power is turned off. This eliminates reloading the program for the keys each time you turn on your system. Craig stated that the prototype was not as yet completed, but he hopes to have the first phase for sale in 10 to 12 weeks. Craig has so far managed to keep his promises although he is often overwhelmed by the response and therefore has trouble filling all the orders as fast as the individuals would like.

Lou Phillips of MYARC introduced a new program from MYARC, called The Program Manager. He also talked at length about the "new" computer. He said he expected to have a working model at the TI show in New Jersey the 15th of March. I personally think that Lou needs to find himself a better salesman. He definitely does not impress me.

Saturday night most of the restaurant was filled with TI-99/4A enthusiasts. Conversation was animated and ranged from usage of our computers to how our Users' Group was organized. Many people were impressed by the size of our membership (70) and by the number that attend our meetings (30-35 average). We were surprised to find that our group was larger than many others in areas where there is a larger population.

The first presentation on Sunday was by the editor of Super 99 Monthly, Richard Mitchell. He discussed his projects with MULTIplan. He is a very interesting person to listen to once he gets over his nervousness. Richard explained that he is working with SYLK files and trying to learn more about how to transfer information in and out of the MULTIplan environment.

Craig presented the DISKASSEMBLER by Tom Freeman. Jack and I know very little about Assembly language, but Craig explained most of the features well enough that we were able to follow some of it. We understood enough to know that the DISKASSEMBLER is definitely a wonderful new tool for the TI.

Craig stated that the last issue of the Smart Programmer is expected to be out soon then he and those working with him will publish their articles through Super 99 Monthly.

Craig then introduced Kent Thompson who helped write the documentation for the DISKASSEMBLER. Kent went on to describe a package he is selling, Real Estate and Tax Planning. Jack and I were so impressed that we decided we wanted the package, as soon as Kent was done we went over to his booth and bought a copy. Kent said that updates will be sent out each year if we send him the diskette with the program on it.

Throughout the weekend we saw Terrie Masters many times. She helped out in many booths to allow the vendors a chance to get out and see what the competition was doing. Terrie worked harder than anyone. Whether or not you went to the '99 Fest West '86, if you appreciate new hardware and software becoming available for your TI you owe Terrie Masters and the workers from the LA Area Groups a "Thank You". If people like her did not put out the effort to put together a weekend like this the TI

community would be the loser.

One of the things we hoped to accomplish when we decide to attend was to get our group better known to the TI community. Another was to meet people with our kind of enthusiasm for this computer. Lastly we wanted to find out about new things for the TI. Whether we were successful in our first objective remains to be seen. Our success in the latter two was complete. I hope we can pass on our enthusiasm to the Southwest Ninety-Niners and other groups who read this newsletter.

A Book Review

Time passes and things are brought into better focus. That's the goal of a new book on the TI Computer, The Orphan Chronicles. Written by Ronald G. Albright, Jr., MD it looks at the TI-99/4A as no one has done so far. Bringing together facts and remembrances of how Texas Instruments got into the Home Computer marketplace and why they bailed-out. He also deals with Users Groups ("Commercial" and "Real"), publications, support, and much more. The book concludes with a chapter entitled "Survival Manual" which applies more to people who may find themselves orphaned in the future than to 99/4A owners. There are extensive appendices at the end of the work which should be of interest to many.

If you're interested in the story of the 99-4A this could be a nice addition to your library. However, be forewarned that it isn't easy reading. Albright's writing style is a bit labored for my tastes and he does seem to repeat himself at times, usually when you'd like things to move along a bit faster. The writing he's done appears to have been for the scientific community not public consumption, you know - stilted. More importantly the print is difficult to read. Published by Millers Graphics the typeface chosen doesn't work for me but it may not bother you.

Personally I'd buy The Orphan Chronicles just to be able to look back on how this machine, which has changed so many lives, came into being and went out of production. You may order your copy from:

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TI WRITER TIPS
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EDITING OPERATIONS

Are you a hunt and peck typist or do your fingers fly over the computer keyboard. Well if you are a fairly good typist you ought to pay attention to the TEXT EDITOR - EDITING OPERATIONS as found in the manual and on the Quick Reference Card. Using the Control Key and one other a touch typist can literally fly through editing operations.

There are fully two pages of operations listed on the quick reference guide. Knowing these functions is the key to fast and easy word processing. Take the time to study and learn each of them. The payoff will be faster word processing and fewer errors in your final text.

One caution, if you do type fast watch out for skipped letters at the beginning of lines when using word wrap. It won't happen every time but frequently enough to catch you if you aren't looking for it.
